Campus Security Authority Incident Report

According to the Higher Education Act, 20 U.S. C. 1092 now known as the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act, the University must collect certain campus crime statistics. This law applies to certain crimes reported to the police and other campus officials.

To assist the University of Mississippi in complying with the federal Clery Act, this form should be utilized by Campus Security Authorities (CSA) to report crimes to UPD as soon as possible after a crime has been reported to the CSA. Under the Clery Act, a crime is reported to a CSA when a student, employee, or third party brings information about an alleged crime to the attention of the CSA and the CSA believes the report was made in good faith. UPD will use the information provided in this form to classify the crime for purposes of inclusion in the University's annual crime statistics.

If you report the incident to the police, please do not fill out this form.

This report is to be forwarded to your Campus Security Authority. The details of this report will not be made public. Only the number of crimes occurring will be released. Your name will not be released. It is not required for the report, but it will help ensure the crime is not counted twice.

Incident Classification for Clery

Aggravated Assault: an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could or probably would result in a serious potential injury if the crime were successfully completed.

Arson: Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling, house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property, etc.

Burglary: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or a felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Dating Violence: Violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim.

Domestic violence: A felony or misdemeanor crime of violence committed by: (1) a current or former spouse of the victim; (2) a person with who the victim shares a child in common; (3) a person who is cohabiting with or has cohabitated with the victim as a spouse; (4) a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic family violence laws of the jurisdiction receiving grant monies; or (5) any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction.

Motor Vehicle Theft: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned-including joy riding).

Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter: The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

Manslaughter by Negligence: The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Robbery: The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force threat of force, violence, and/ or causing the victim fear.

Sex offense, forcible: Rape, sodomy, sexual fondling, or sexual assault with object. This includes the forcible rape of both males and females.

Forcible Sodomy: Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

Sexual Assault with an Object: The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person. An object or instrument is anything used by the offender other than the offender's genitalia. Examples are finger, bottle, handgun, stick, etc.

Forcible Fondling: The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/ her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

Sex offense, non-forcible: Statutory rape (victim under the legal age of consent) or incest

Stalking: Engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause reasonable person to fear for his or her safety or the safety of others or suffer substantial emotional distress.

Drug Abuse Violations: Violations of state and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, methadones); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzadrine).

Liquor Law Violations: The violation of laws or ordinance prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned violations. *Public intoxication and DUI are not reportable incidences.

Weapon Law Violations: The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.
